Coralville is very blessed to have many generous donors who keep the Friend's Room stocked with inventory. Our vice president **LeeAnn Logan** has continually done a phenomenal job a categorizing books so shopping is easier. Also in this newsletter, read how she has also received the most notable Library volunteer honor.

During the pandemic instead of setting a per item price for book sale items, we started asking for just donations. This change has been successful. We have been impressed with the generosity of our patrons. Some people ask what is fair and ask for suggestions. It's up to you but, a guide might be the former prices \$1 for paperbacks, \$2 for hardcovers, 25 cents for children's books and media for \$1. Because of your generosity, the Library, Coralville Central, Kirkwood, Northwest Jr High, and the Coralville Community Food Pantry all received significant grants.

In our recent donations we received a huge selection of the Great Courses Books and DVDs. What a treasure of knowledge. They would make great Christmas gifts. (Hint)

In the last sale and also for November the Library Foundation will have a selection of stained-glass art and local area prints. At the August sale 43 of the prints and 24 stained glass items were sold. There is still a significant selection available including some really unique lamps.

Besides providing funds to the library and local schools, we have helped the prison as our new intern, **Kenny Mack**, is a library science major doing his practicum at the Coralville library and has a special interest in working with prisons. The Friends have also provided books for a school in Liberia.

We hope soon to direct you to the Peace Pole on the library grounds. The pole says "May Peace Prevail" in eight different languages and was donated by Veterans for Peace in honor of **Lloyd and Donna Epley,** long-time CPL supporters. Be on the lookout for the date of dedication.

Hopefully you will attend the sale, donate books and, if possible, volunteer as you can.

Another reminder—you will be receiving a note about membership renewal. Memberships are only \$15 but many people donate more, which is also much appreciated.

She has wonderfully vivid memories of her childhood and growing up in Iowa City and many of the famous authors who were guests in the Engle home. It will be a delightful program.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES

We had a wonderful summermore than 1,200 children signed up for the Summer Reading Challenge. We hosted 48 children's events at the library, many of which included special guests that you generously funded. Each of these programs created an opportunity for children and families to experience something special together and hopefully fostered lasting memories. We were thrilled to offer several programs about animals and conservation efforts, which fit in very well with our Summer Reading theme, "Read, Renew, Repeat!"

On June 11, more than 300 people walked through the Barnyard Discoveries mobile petting zoo to meet a piglet, a miniature pony, a cow, two goats—named Sam and Frodo, and many other animals.

Around 90 young children and caregivers enjoyed using their imaginations to visit outer space with musical guest **Dino O'Dell** on June 18. **Magician Mikayla Oz** returned on June 19 with a show that engaged the whole family (145 people) and resulted in wild and joyful laughter.

On July 10, nearly 90 children and caregivers enjoyed learning about sharks with "Ocean Odyssey," the National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium's traveling touch tank. After learning about the animals, kids had the opportunity to get up close and touch a shark. At our July 22 Family Night, the lowa Raptor Project brought three raptors with them-a kestrel, a barn owl, and a red-tailed hawk. An audience of 75 enjoyed this event.

In addition to funding special guests, your support of the Summer Reading Challenge provides fantastic incentives for participants. Children love choosing a book for a halfway prize. This summer, we handed out 550 books! Children also get to enter a virtual ticket into a prize drawing when they finish. Thank you for providing funds to allow us to buy prizes that appealed to each age group. This year we offered wooden puzzles and toys, a tiny gardening set, a movie theater gift card, and Prairie Lights gift certificates.

Thank you, as well, for your ongoing support of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library of Coralville. We have 480 registered children and 186 graduates! So far, children in Coralville and rural Johnson County have received 11,631 books.

Thank you for your continued support of children's services at the library and your dedication to serving the community of Coralville.

We are also thankful for the T-shirts you provided for our hard-working Teen Advisory Board members. These shirts, designed by the teens themselves, are worn at all teen events during the summer. Your funding for the monthly craft kits, distributed every third Wednesday of each month throughout the year, has been invaluable.

We are incredibly grateful for the Friends' consistent recognition of our dedicated teen volunteers. The Friends Teen Service Award, in the amount of \$1000, was presented to **Carly Ephraim**, a deserving West High School senior, at the annual April Friends Meeting. This year marks the fourteenth anniversary of this annual award, which assists a graduating high school senior with their future education.

Furthermore, Aster Jacobson, a teen volunteer, was acknowledged for volunteering almost 200 hours this past year and received \$100 to purchase books in their name for the library.

We truly appreciate the Friends' generosity and cannot thank you enough. Many of the services we provide to our youth would not be possible without your support. Investing in our youth is a worthwhile and meaningful use of your funding, as they are one of our community's most valuable assets.
