#### From the president

Looking outside you can see the season changing, but what hasn't changed is the generosity of the Coralville community, Because of your generosity we were able to fund many extra programs at the library. Here's the amounts that the Friends have raised in each of the last 4 sales:

We were also able to give grants to Coralville Central, Northwest Middle School (which was in great need because of the addition of the 6th grade to the facility), Kirkwood Elementary, and the Community Food Pantry. What a blessing. Everyone is a winner—the donor, the buyer, the library, and the community. We have our next sale on **November 7 and 8**. Book donations are always needed and it's also a great place to find some great Christmas gifts.

Some of you have asked what is the difference between the Friends, the Foundation and the Library Trustees. Think of this as levels of service. The **Friend's** main concern is fostering the love of reading by providing funds to the library basically from the book sales. Each year we get a wish list from the Library staff. One of the projects we used to do was Baby Book Bags. We now support Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, co-sponsoring that program with the Foundation and the Library Board. We also provide funds to local schools and the Food Pantry to foster reading. The Friends Board is elected by its membership. Our monthly meetings are open to the public

\*The **Foundation** is the next level up. Started in 1998 they handle larger projects and are equipped to receive gifts and bequests. They build funds to help ensure the long-term stability of the Library and coordinate fundraising for major capital projects. They also sponsor the sale of shirts through a partnership with Raygun—all proceeds, beyond cost, go to the foundation. New foundation members are appointed by current foundation membership, per their by-laws.

The **Library Board of Trustees** members are appointed by the Coralville mayor and approved by city council. It is the top level overseeing the operation and expenditures of the library. The library director presents budget and policy issues in monthly meetings with the trustees.

The **Friends'** success is primarily due to your support—donations and member-ship—and is greatly appreciated.

### CHILDREN'S SERVICES

We had a very busy summer "leveling up" at the library! More than 1,050 children signed up for the Summer Reading Challenge. We hosted 43 events for children at the library and ventured out to North Ridge Park and the Coralville Community Food Pantry weekly. Thanks to support from the Friends, we were able to invite many special guests. Through all of these events, we strive to foster positive feelings toward the library and within the community and create lasting memories for families.

On June 2, more than 180 people attended a reptile show with the Cold-Blooded Redhead. Kids and families enjoyed interacting with the animals, especially the snakes and giant tortoise. Prairie Patch Farms was a huge hit with children, adults, and library staff! The 110-person audience learned fascinating facts about llamas and alpacas and then posed for selfies with two llamas. Carole Stephens of Macaroni Soup has been a popular entertainer and returned June 24 with an interactive than 50 school-aged children and caregivers watched and participated in a mix of science experiments with the Grout Museum of Iowa. The combination of dry ice and a balloon was a particular favorite.

Thank you for funding fabulous incentives for Summer Reading participants. We love being able to provide a book as a halfway prize; caregivers always seem happy about this reward as well. It's so special for the children to get to choose from a variety of titles; 420 books were selected this summer! Participants may also enter into a prize drawing when their reading challenge is completed. This added bonus can make all the difference in motivating a child to finish. Your gift allowed us to purchase prizes related to the Level Up theme for each age group. This year we offered board games, puzzles, movie theater and bookstore gift certificates, and "mystery bags" of games.

Thank you for your ongoing support of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library of Coralville. Our prodren; 506 are currently registered! So far, children in Coralville and rural Johnson County have received 17,596 books.

I was born in Mitchell and grew up in Parkston, SD. My education included a BS and MS in Education (Elementary and Special) both from USD in Vermillion, SD. I taught at Yankton High School, where I was tasked with starting a Resource Room to support educationally challenged students.

Before Friends supported the Imagination Library, I co-chaired the Friends Baby Book Bag program ordering, organizing and distributing the books where needed, later developing an additional program that allowed the Friends to support other early childhood readers.

I enjoy reading murder mysteries, crossword puzzles, going to the theater and movies, and visiting the Minnesota Arboretum.

The move Coralville was a great decision.

## ADULT PROGRAMMING

Thank you, Friends, for supporting our Adult Summer Reading Challenge and activities. This summer we were able to provide more programs for adults including a Puzzle Competition and Trivia Event. Both programs were well attended, and because of the Friends, we were able to award prizes to the winning teams

I once heard the Friends described as the Library's indulgent grandparents; an apt description as they fund all of our prizes. Friends money allowed us to give away \$600 worth of gift cards to local businesses for the Adult Summer Reading Challenge Grand Prize Drawings.

But you didn't have to win to walk away with a prize. Due to the generosity of the Friends and of our community's like-new book donations, we gave away a free book to everyone who completed our Adult

Summer Reading Challenge—a total of 496 books!

New this year by request, we had a Large Print Prize Cart which was welcomed by older readers.

## DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

A big thank you for your ongoing support of our reading programs. We had over 1,000 children participate in this year's summer reading challenge, and over 400 teens. We had close to 950 adults sign up for the adult summer reading challenge with half of those submitting a reading log at the end of the summer. The programs throughout the summer were extremely well attended—a very successful summer of reading across the board!

Fall is well under way, and that means the Engle Prize event at CPL is coming up. The **Paul Engle Prize**, awarded by the lowa City UNESCO City of Literature, is made possible through the generous support of the City of Coralville and is held annually at the Coralville Public Library.

The annual Paul Engle Prize event will be on Sunday, November 16 at 2:00 p.m. Cole Swensen, an acclaimed poet who has authored 20 collections of poetry and taught at the Iowa Writers' Workshop for more than a decade, is this year's winner. Swenson, a prolific translator, has translated more than 30 books of French poetry, creative nonfiction, and art and criticism. She will be in conversation with Christopher Merrill, director of the International Writers' Program. I hope you can attend the event as well as the reception afterwards, held in the CPL rotunda and sponsored by the Foundation. The event is free and everyone is welcome!

Paul Engle's daughter, Mary Engle Burge, will also be back in Iowa for the Engle Prize event. Many of you had the opportunity to attend her presentation at CPL last fall. She will be doing an event for the public on November 18, 7:00 pm, at the lowa City Public Library—sharing memories from her childhood in lowa City, her father and the lowa Writers' Workshop in the early days. Mary has wonderfully vivid memories of her childhood and growing up in lowa City and fascinating stories about the famous authors who were guests in the Engle home. Like last year's program, I'm sure it will be a delightful evening.
